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Final orbit-raising manoeuvre of Chandrayaan-3 completed

ISRO will perform TransLunar Injection on August 1 to slingshot Chandrayaan-3 towards moon; the four previous orbit-raising manoeuvres were performed between July 15 and July 20



he Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO) on Tuesday successfully completed the fifth and final orbit-raising manoeuvre (earth-bound perigee firing) of the Chandrayaan-3 mission. It was performed successfully from ISRO Telemetry, Tracking and Command Network (ISTRAC) in Bengaluru.

The spacecraft is expected to attain an orbit of 1,27,609 km x 236 km. This means that Chandrayaan-3 is now in an orbit which, when closest to earth is at 236 km and when farthest is at 1,27,609 km.

"The achieved orbit will

be confirmed after the observations," ISRO said after the successful orbit-raising manoeuvre.

The four earlier orbitraising manoeuvres were performed by ISTRAC between July 15 and July 20.

Following the final orbitraising manoeuvre, ISRO will perform the TransLunar Injection (TLI) on August 1 to slingshot Chandrayaan-3 towards the moon. "The next firing, the TransLunar Injection (TLI), is planned for August 1, 2023, between midnight and 1 a.m. IST," ISRO said.

The Chandrayaan-3 consists of a lander module (LM), propulsion module (PM) and a rover which was launched by the LVM3-M4 on July 14.

After the TLI takes place, the PM and the LM separation will happen on August 17.

A series of deboost manoeuvres is also scheduled to take place before the power descent phase for the soft landing on the moon.

The lander is expected to touch down on the moon surface on August 23 at 5.47 p.m.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Chinese President Xi Jinping reached a "consensus" to restore bilateral ties during their meeting in Bali last year, said China, the first time either side has suggested that the meeting between the two leaders at a dinner had included any substantial conversation.

The claim was made in a Chinese Foreign Ministry statement issued after a meeting between National Security Adviser (NSA) Ajit Doval and his counterpart Director of the Central Foreign Affairs Commission of the Communist Party of China Wang Yi in Johannesburg, where both advisers are attending the BRICS meeting of NSAs.

The Indian statement on the Doval-Wang meeting did not include any reference to the claim, and instead focused on the continuing Line of Actual Control (LAC) stand-off that Mr. Doval said had "eroded" the "public and political basis" of the ties.

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Arrived at consensus on ties in Bali, says China

"NSA conveyed that the situation along the LAC in the Western Sector of the India-China boundary since 2020 had eroded strategic trust and the public and political basis of the relationship," the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) press release said on Tuesday about the meeting that took place on Monday. "NSA emphasised the importance of continuing efforts to fully resolve the situation and restore peace and tranquillity in the border areas, so as to remove impediments to normalcy in bilateral relations," it said, adding that both agreed that the India-China bilateral relationship was significant "not only for the two countries but also for the region and world".

The meeting between Mr. Doval and Mr. Wang, came days after Wang Yi met External Affairs Minister S. Jaishankar for talks in Jakarta on July 14 on the side-lines of the East Asia Summit (EAS) and ASEAN Regional Forum's Foreign Minister's meeting. The meetings have increased speculation over whether Mr. Modi and Mr. Xi will meet at the BRICS summit in Cape Town in August or at the G-20 Summit in Delhi.

Mr. Modi and Mr. Xi have not spoken since the beginning of the LAC standoff in April 2020 that led to the killings of soldiers in Galwan. However, at a dinner for G-20 leaders in Bali last November, Mr. Modi was seen walking over to Mr. Xi and holding a conversation that lasted a few minutes. The MEA had brushed off the encounter at the time. However, in its statement, the Chinese MFA claimed that at the Bali meeting, the leaders had spoken in more detail.

"At the end of last year, President Xi Jinping and Prime Minister Modi reached an important consensus on stabilizing China-India relations in Bali," said the Chinese MFA statement.

"The two sides should adhere to the strategic judgment of the leaders of the two countries that "they do not pose a threat to each other, and they are each other's development opportunities", " it added, urging an "early" return of bilateral relations to the "track of healthy and stable development." The MEA declined to comment on the Chinese contention.

Status report

After taking note of a status report filed by the DGP with respect to the steps taken to expand the SIWs to other police stations, as well as the progress made on creating the digital evidence manual, the judges asked the SPP to ensure that a further status report regarding the progress made by all SIWs was filed in the High Court by September 22.

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Stalin writes to Jaishankar, calls for diplomatic efforts to resolve fishermen's issues

Expressing concern over the recurring arrest of Tamil Nadu fishermen by Sri Lankan Navy, the Chief Minister underscores the need for a constructive dialogue to find a lasting solution

of nine fishermen by the Sri Lankan Navy, Chief Minister M.K. Stalin wrote to Minister for External Affairs S. Jaishankar on Tuesday, requesting him to make diplomatic efforts to resolve issues of the Tamil Nadu fishermen.

Expressing his concern over the recurring arrest of Tamil Nadu fishermen by the Sri Lankan Navy, he recalled his request to the Prime Minister to take up the matter with utmost importance during the visit of the Sri Lankan President to India a few days ago. "I had hoped that this visit would provide an opportunity to engage in a constructive dialogue and find a lasting solution that respects the rights and livelihoods of both Indian and Sri Lankan fishermen," he said in the letter, a copy of which was released to the media.

Referring to the arrest of nine fishermen on Tuesday, Mr. Stalin said, "Despite the high-level interactions between the two nations, the situation on the ground remains unchanged."

'Severe repercussions'

The fishing communities in Tamil Nadu continued to face immense hardships owing to the recurrent arrest of fishermen and seizure of their boats, the Chief Minister said, contending that these incidents strained bilateral relations and had severe socio-economic repercus-

sions for the affected families.

Mr. Stalin reiterated his request to the Union Minister to make all diplomatic efforts to ensure the release of the arrested fishermen, retrieve their seized boats and re-emphasise the significance of a lasting and mutually acceptable solution to the issue of fishing rights in the Palk Bay.

Ramanathapuram meet

Mr. Stalin will take part in a State-wide conference to be organised by fishermen associations in Ramanathapuram on August 18. It will condemn the continuous attack on, and arrest of, fishermen by the Sri Lankan Navy.

According to an official release from Minister for Fisheries Anitha R. Radhakrishnan, the Chief Minister's participation in the conference followed representations from fishermen associations.

"The conference will be held in Ramanathapuram on August 18 to protect the fishermen's livelihood, condemn the recurring incidents of assault on, and arrest of, Tamil Nadu fishermen by the Sri Lankan Navy and demand measures to prevent such incidents," Mr. Radhakrishnan said.

Mr. Radhakrishnan referred to the arrest of the nine fishermen on Tuesday and recalled the efforts being made by the Chief Minister against such incidents, including his writing to Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Mr. Iaishankar.



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Headcount of children under way across State to improve immunisation coverage

To ensure that no child has missed out on vaccine doses or is left out of routine immunisation, a head-count through a door-to-door survey has started across Tamil Nadu. Village Health Nurses (VHNs) are making household visits to identify drop-out/left-out children aged below five.

Childhood immunisation under the Universal Immunisation Programme, which was affected during the COVID-19 pandemic, has bounced back with focused measures, according to health officials.

'Three initiatives'

"We have three initiatives. First is the Intensified Mission Indradhanush, through which measures are being taken for identifying left-out children. We have trained our field staff to do a house-to-house headcount of children who have been left out. We should not be satisfied with 99%-100% coverage, but should ensure that no child is left out," said T.S. Selvavinayagam, Director of Public Health and Preventive Medicine.

A total of 11 vaccines for 12 diseases should be administered till the age of five, said M. Senthil Kumar, deputy director, Institute of Public Health, Poonamallee. "Drop-out means a child has missed one or two doses of a vaccine. Such children can be tracked easily through our existing system. There are left-out children, meaning those who did not come on our radar," he explained.

This is why the special drive is in progress under the Intensified Mission Indradhanush to strengthen immunisation coverage, he said. Dr. Selvavinayagam added that data from the headcount would be entered into U-WIN, a platform for monitoring routine immunisation of children, to help in further follow-up. The second initiative for improving immunisation was the expansion to the entire State of the U-WIN portal, which was piloted in Erode and Dindigul.

"Third, we are focusing on two indicators for Measles-Rubella (MR) elimination. The first indicator is to ensure 95% coverage for MR vaccination. Secondly, we should have a nonmeasles, non-rubella discard rate of more than two per million population. We should be able to pick up suspected cases and rule out measles or rubella. Now, there might be silent blocks or areas from where nothing is getting reported. So, we will be focusing on silent blocks to bring them on our radar," he explained.

Extending the reach

The Health Dept. is carrying out a headcount of children left out of immunisation. Here is the performance of some indicators with respect to immunisation

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Lok Sabha passes contentious Biological Diversity Bill amid din

Environment Minister Bhupendra Yadav says amendments necessary to address issues in 20-year-old Act; green activists argue it will 'solely benefit' AYUSH firms; House panel had said proposed exemptions may pave way for abuse of law

he Lok Sabha on Tuesday passed the Biological Diversity (Amendment) Bill, 2021 amid sloganeering by Opposition members demanding that Prime Minister Narendra Modi make a statement on the Manipur violence. The Bill aims to amend the Biological Diversity Act, 2002.

"In the 20 years since the Act was brought into force by the Vajpayee government, we have seen that there were problems and it was necessary to address them," Bhupendra Yadav, Minister for Environment and Forests and Climate Change, said. "To ensure that tribes and vulnerable communities

benefit from the proceeds of medicinal forest products, these amendments were necessary. By decriminalising certain activties, we are encouraging Ayurveda as well as ease of

doing business."

The amended Bill was drafted in response to complaints by traditional Indian medicine practitioners, the seed sector, industry and researchers that the Act imposed a heavy "compliance burden".

The Bill sought to exempt registered AYUSH medical practitioners and people accessing codified traditional knowledge, among others, from giving prior intimation to State biodiversity Boards to access biological resources for certain purposes.

Environmental organisations such as Legal Initiative for Forests and Environment (LIFE) have said that the amendments were made to "solely benefit" AY-USH (Ayurveda, Yoga and Naturopathy, Unani, Siddha and Homeopathy) firms and would pave the way for "bio piracy".

The Bill decriminalises a range of offences under the Act and substitutes them with monetary penalties.

An analysis by the Centre for Science and Environment and the Down To Earth magazine on how the Biodiversity Act was being practically implemented, showed serious shortcomings. There was no data – barring in a few States – on the money received from companies and traders for access and benefit-sharing from use of traditional knowledge and resources.

A Joint Parliamentary Committee was constituted in December 2021 to analyse the amendment Bill.

Congress spokesperson Jairam Ramesh, who was a member of the committee, in a letter addressed to other members and BJP MP Sanjay Jaiswal, committee chairperson, said that these exemptions could open the law for abuse.



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President opens tribal arts gallery at Rashtrapati Bhavan as she finishes a year in office

On a day when India's first President from the tribal community, Droupadi Murmu, completed one year in office, the Rashtrapati Bhavan on Tuesday got a unique gallery dedicated to tribal arts, culture and heroes.

The gallery, which is around 2,200 square feet in area, has been developed by the Indira Gandhi National Centre for Arts, an autonomous institution under the Union Culture Ministry.

Ms. Murmu took over as the 15th President of the country last July and is the first from the tribal community. She hails from a small village, Uparbeda in Odisha, and had worked as a teacher.

Name of the gallery

The new gallery 'Janjatiya Darpan' (tribal mirror) was inaugurated by Ms. Murmu at the Rashtrapati Bhavan.

The gallery showcases different themes such as

unsung tribal freedom fighters, traditional natural resource management practices such as Halma, tribal art such as Dokra, musical instruments and various scripts such as Guniala Gondi.

It also houses agricultural and household implements, bamboo baskets, textiles, paintings such as Warli, Gondi and mud art, scrolls, masks and jewellery, metal work, weapons, and contemporary photographs depicting tattoos.

"The aim of this gallery is to provide a glimpse of rich art, culture and the contributions of tribal communities in building this nation," a Rashtrapati Bhavan statement said.

Build in 10 days

Sources in the IGNCA said that the gallery was created within a short span of 10 days.

The President also inaugurated 'Navachara', an artificial intelligence-enabled gallery developed by the Rashtrapati Bhavan, in collaboration with Intel India and 'Sutra-kala Darpan', a textile collection which showcases a collection of textiles that document the illustrious legacy of the Rashtrapati Bhavan.
